- November 2010 Seems So Long Ago
 - Historic Election Results
 - Republicans gain 63 seats
 - Largest gain since 1948
 - 242 Republican members
 - Democrats retain control of the Senate
 - Majority shrinks to 53
 - The further from 60, the more difficult
 - Governors & State Houses
 - Republicans gain 10 governorships
 - 20+ state chambers flip to Republican control

A Polarized Congress

- Moderates in Both Parties Lost Seats in 2010
- Compromise is Not Looked Upon Favorably
- Leadership Squabble In House
- Democrats Beginning to Distance Themselves From the President
- "Stimulus" and "Bailout" are 4-Letter Words

Electoral Volatility (to say the least)

- ➤ 1955-1994 40-Year Democratic Control of House of Representatives
- ➤ 1994-2006 12-Year Republican Control of House of Representatives
- ➤ 2006-2010 4-Year Democratic Control of House of Representatives
- > 2012-????
- Is Change the New Constant?
- Is Anger the New Mood?

Occupy Wall Street (and other places)

- Left Wing Tea Party?


The Senate Looks Tippy

- > 53 Democrats 47 Republicans
 - 23 Democrat seats up for re-election
 - 10 Republican seats up for re-election
 - Vulnerable seats: 10 Democrat, 2 Republican.
 - Republicans only need a net gain of 4
 - Independent Voters Key
 - 2006: Independents voted 57%-39% for Democrats
 - Senators up for reelection this cycle were elected
 - Republicans lose 6 Senate seats
 - 2010: Independents voted 56%-38% for Republicans
 - Republican House swept into office
 - Democrats lose 6 Senate seats

The House is Less Certain

- Democrats Would Need Net Gain of 26 Seats
 - Republicans can sustain some losses
 - Democrats unlikely to hold all seats
- > Incumbents Could Be At Risk
 - Several Tea Party Republicans elected in swing districts formerly held by moderate Democrats
 - Anger could impact both parties





 - PA, NC, VA, WI, MI, OH, CO, NV, FL


The Generic Ballot

Obama (Blue) vs. Generic GOP Candidate (Red)






Republican Nomination Trend




Steady (Boring?) Mitt...






Sarah Can Read the Tea Leaves...




Front-Loaded Republican Primaries




People to DC: We're On the Wrong Track

State of the Country: Right Direction / Wrong Track




The President's Political DNA






Independents Haven't Wavered

Another Worry for White House & Democrats:

"How enthusiastic would you say you are about voting for president in next year's election?"

Democrats:

Extremely or Very enthusiastic: 43%

Somewhat enthusiastic: 34%

Not too enthusiastic: 10%

Not at all enthusiastic: 12%

Republicans

Extremely or Very enthusiastic: 64%

Somewhat enthusiastic: 20%

Not too enthusiastic: 7%


Not at all enthusiastic: 9%

What About Pennsylvania?

- > Sen. Casey Runs for Reelection in 2012
 - Favorable rating: 47%
 - Job approval rating: 46%
 - Support against generic Republican: 46%
- > Few House Seats Considered Vulnerable
 - Redistricting could affect Altmire, Doyle, Critz
 - Fitzpatrick & Meehan are in swing districts
