- Peak appropriation in 2008-09 at \$407.4 million
- Recent History
 - DE Integration (Act 5 of 2018)
 - HQD schools: full DE integration
 - Non-HQD schools: eligibility unchanged



2020-21 Application Cycle Challenge

March 5, 2020

• 2020-21 PA State Grant applicant deflation was -3.5%

March 16, 2020

- 2020-21 PA State Grant applicant deflation was -2.8%
- Governor Wolf announced that statewide COVID-19 mitigation efforts would go into effect March 17

March 19, 2020

- PHEAA's Board took action to provide for the temporary modification of certain requirements of PHEAA-administered programs to ensure that recipients wouldn't experience a disruption or reduction of funding due to operational changes made by schools in response to COVID-19
- This action included a 2-week extension of the PA State Grant application deadline from May 1 to May 15

2020-21 Application Cycle Results

May 1

• 2020-21 PA State Grant applicant deflation was -8.7% as of the original PA State Grant application deadline (prior to the 2-week extension)

May 6

• Representative Mike Peifer, PHEAA Board Chairman, publicized the deadline extension at a virtual news conference with PHEAA staff


May 15

- 2020-21 PA State Grant applicant deflation was -6.5% as of the extended PA State Grant application deadline
- The 2-week extension was a resounding success, with 17,000 additional students applying for a PA State Grant

Overall, the number of PA State Grant recipients, with a valid Pennsylvania county, decreased by 13,960 students or 9.84% from 2019-20 to 2020-21.



- Act 101 Program
 - Updated Program Guidelines to address CARES Act funding
- IAG Program
 - 2019-20 final per capita of \$690
 - 2020-21 per capita is higher due to \$5 million in CARES Act funding
 - 2020-21 final per capita estimated to be \$784
- IAG and Act 101 schools need to spend CARES Act funds by December 31, 2020



2020-21 PA State Grant Program

- 2020-21 appropriation
 - Level-funded at \$310.7 million
- Supplemented by
 - \$30 million of federal stimulus funds from the CARES Act
 - Up to \$15 million from PHEAA's business earnings
- 2020-21 maximum award = \$4,525
 - Second highest max award in program history

	PA State Grant Program - COVID-19 Guidance for the 2020-21 Academic Year

Throughout 2020, the Pennsylvania Higher Education Assistance Agency (PHEAA) has continuously been reviewing the impact of COVID-19 on students as it reliates to the PA State Grant Program. Recognizing that the primary concern of schools is to protect the health and adafty of students, PHEAA has been in communication with many postsecondary schools as they have made operational changes for the 2020-21 Academic Year. As the Fail 2020 term unfolds, PHEAA understands that many institutions have found it necessary to adjust the delivery model of coursework to allow students the flexibility needed to continue their studies.

On September 17, 2025, the PHEAA Board of Directors again exercised 8s authority as administrator and servicer of the PA State Grant Program to provide relief to impacted students as they pursue their postsecondary education while the Governor's disaster declaration remains in effect. While this relief differs from what was provided in the Winter, Spring and Summer 2020 terms, PHEAA's goal continues to be to review policies and take appropriate actions that minimize disruption for Pennsylvania's student population by easing financial burdens and maintaining access to higher education, within the bounds of statutory authority.

Please review the following guidance related to PA State Grant Program requirements and note that this only applies to the 2020-21 Academic Year, including fall, winter, and spring terms as applicable within each institution's academic calendar:

Non-Headquartered and Domiciled (Non-HQD) Institutions

Students reported as "DE Program of Study" will continue to be ineligible for a PA State Grant award (Reject G). Please continue to report the actual enrolment mode for each of your students. This applies even if a student is being reported as an enrolment mode 3 or 4 only as a result of the school's changes to course delivery due to COVID-19. Effective immediately for the 2020-21 Academic Year terms, students reported as enrollment mode 3 or 4, will not receive an Amaricans with Disabilities Act (ADA) notification letter, but will instead remain eligible for their PA State Grant award. Previously cancelled awards will be reinstated. Students who received a latter within the past 30 days need not respond. Updates to our website and student portal are expected to be in place soon.

Headquartered and Domiciled (HQD) Institutions:

Please continue to report the actual enrollment mode for each of your students. This applies even if a student is being reported as an enrollment mode 3 or 4 only as a result of the school's changes to course delivery due to COVID-19.

All Institutions

The following guidance will assist you in determining each student's appropriate enrollment mode for the fail, winter, and spring terms of the 2020-21 Academic Year. The below items highlight guidance contained in the PA State Grant Handbook. Enrollment mode must match the student's faal enrolment used for eligibility determination, including ALL credits or clock hours which count toward establishing a student's enrollment.


- Non-Headquartered and Domiciled (Non-HQD) Institutions:
 - Students reported as "DE Program of Study" will continue to be ineligible for a PA State Grant award (Reject G). Effective immediately for the 2020-21 Academic Year terms, students reported as enrollment mode 3 or 4, will not receive an Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) notification letter, but will instead remain eligible for their PA State Grant award. Previously cancelled awards will be reinstated. Students who received a letter within the past 30 days need not respond. - Headquartered and Domiciled (HQD) Institutions:

- New Sub-Report "Students with Cost Overrides"
 - Appended to the existing "Validation/Other Reviews" PageCenter report
 - Runs weekly
 - Cumulative list of:
 - All students processed with Cost Override
 - Term or terms
 - Regular Tuition and Fees
 - Cost Override Tuition and Fees
- "Academic Progress Approvals, Denials and Exceptions"
 - Runs weekly
 - Contains a row for each term for which the student has or had been reported as an academic progress issue, with another row for approval/denial due to COVID-19

2020-21 October Verification

- October verification letters were sent out on Wednesday, October 7 to students who were processed based on reduced income for the Fall Term of 2020-21.
- In order to determine the student's eligibility for the Winter and/or Spring Terms, students must provide an updated estimate of income from January 1, 2020 through December 31, 2020 for:
 - Parents (if dependent) or
 - Student and spouse (if independent)
- These forms are sent one time only to those previously processed on reduced income.

Enhancements to "Not Enrolled" Reporting

- *New* in September 2020
- Effective with the 2020-21 Academic Year and 2020 Summer Term, school users may submit term-by-term updates to report "not enrolled" or reinstate "not enrolled."
- How to Report "Not Enrolled"
 - Regardless of the student's record status, school users may report students as not enrolled using the existing term Cancellation/Reinstatement fields on the PA State Grant Certification Transmission.
 - Until the next iteration, school users who do not use Certification Transmissions and who need to report a student as "not enrolled" may submit a Special Request.

Enhancements to "Not Enrolled" Reporting

Impact on Status Listing

- "Not Enrolled" students **will not appear** on the report if the students:
 - Are marked as not enrolled for all terms at the same school; and
 - Did not have a disbursement.
- "Not Enrolled" students **will continue to appear** on the report if the students:
 - Are marked as not enrolled for at least one term but enrolled for the other term at the same school; or
 - Had a disbursement for the term in which they are marked as not enrolled.

Ready to Succeed Scholarship (RTSS) Program

- For 2020-21, the minimum GPA for RTSS Program eligibility has returned to 3.25
- Schools are still not required to report any student GPA data below the minimum eligible GPA for the program
- 2020-21 appropriation of \$5.55 million



Ready to Succeed Scholarship (RTSS) Program


- The initial 2020-21 RTSS eligibility run was conducted on Wednesday, October 14, making awards available for schools to certify.
- Eligibility and review letters were sent to RTSS students on Tuesday, October 20.
- The first fall disbursement will run this Wednesday, October 28.
 - As a reminder, only awards that are certified by the institution are eligible for disbursement.

Chafee Education and Training Grant Program

- PHEAA partners with the Pennsylvania Department of Human Services (DHS) in the administration of the Chafee Education and Training Grant (Chafee ETG) Program.
- 2020-21 funding has been exhausted, and remaining applicants have been placed in a "funding hold" status.
- PageCenter report "Chafee Denial Listing" (pageset FCFSXH110). This denial reason is designated with the label "Max Funding."
 - Applicants placed on a funding hold are advised that their application will be reviewed if funding becomes available.
 - Funding may become available as institutions review the Applicant Certification and Status Listings (ACSLs) and determine applicants to be ineligible.
 - Funds available to subsequent applicants on a first-come, first-served basis.

Fostering Independence Tuition Waiver Program

- The Fostering Independence Tuition Waiver (FosterEd) Program provides tuition waivers at postsecondary institutions for eligible youth who are or have been in foster care.
- To participate, eligible youth must:
 - File a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA[®])
 - Submit a Chafee ETG application
 - Enroll in an eligible PA postsecondary institution
- For a list of postsecondary institutions and additional information, visit <u>PHEAA.org/FosterEd</u>.



Fostering Independence Tuition Waiver Program

- To be eligible for the tuition waiver, students must meet the following criteria:
 - Be a Pennsylvania resident
 - Be under age 26
 - Received a high school diploma or equivalent approved credential
 - Be eligible for services under Pennsylvania's John H. Chafee Foster Care Program for Successful Transition to Adulthood
 - Be identified as a youth in foster care, or a youth discharged from foster care at age 16 or older
 - Exited foster care on or after age 16 to adoption or permanent legal custodianship
 - Be enrolled as an undergraduate, at least half time in a postsecondary institution that is approved by the U.S. Department of Education for Title IV student assistance programs
 - Demonstrated financial need for the PA Chafee Education and Training Grant (Chafee ETG), as determined by the postsecondary institution
 - Maintain satisfactory academic progress, as determined by the postsecondary institution
 - Not be in default on a federal student loan

Fostering Independence Tuition Waiver Program

How does a student receive the waiver?

- File the FAFSA
- Enroll in a PA postsecondary institution approved by the U.S. Department of Education for Title IV funding.
- Apply for and be eligible for the Chafee Education and Training Grant (Chafee ETG).
- Mail or fax a completed Chafee ETG application to:

PA National Guard Military Family Education Program

- "PA GI Bill" EAP expansion
- Enable PA National Guard members to earn educational benefits for their spouse and children by committing to a second obligation of 6 years
- Ten semesters/quarters or 5 years equivalent at the lesser of:
 - 100% of tuition plus technology fee, OR
 - The annual tuition rate charged to a Pennsylvania resident at a state-owned university plus technology fee
- Intended to increase retention rates in the Pennsylvania National Guard

PA National Guard Military Family Education Program

- The Pennsylvania National Guard Military Family Education Program (MFEP) grant can be used for a degree-granting curriculum or certificate-granting, course of study, or training programs required for entrance into a specific career at an approved PHEAA institution of higher learning for up to 5 academic years.
- The PA Guard Member can assign the entire benefit to one dependent or a portion of the benefit to more than one dependent.
 - A spouse can use the assigned MFEP benefit up to 6 years after the member's separation from the PA Guard.
 - Children can use the assigned MFEP benefit before reaching 26 years of age.
- If the service commitment with the Pennsylvania National Guard is not completed, the recipient must repay the total MFEP award amount, plus interest.
 - Coming soon: EAP and MFEP Doc Upload for service members!

PA Targeted Industry Program (PA-TIP)

2019-20

- Expansion to include select health programs of study
 - September 2019 PHEAA Board decision
 - The number of PA-TIP eligible schools increased from 44 in 2018-19 to over 60 in 2019-20
 - Over 20 newly-eligible programs of study were added as a result of the health expansion

NEW for 2020-21

- Realignment of eligible programs of study utilizing the PA IDOL
 - Grandfathering those students who were previously enrolled in the eliminated programs of study
 - Appeal process for schools with eliminated programs of study




