**Join us for our March 9<sup>th</sup> Roundtable Webinar**



Kim McCurdy, Executive Assistant, Pennsylvania Dept of Education and Past President of the Roundtable will lead a discussion titled **"Reviewing Your Year: Feeling Frustrated but Staying the Course Alone and Together"** *This has been a hard year in many ways and for varied reasons, personally and professionally. Sometimes working in your silo can be a good thing – a time to regroup, educate yourself on issues, and re-commit to your purpose (your why?). Discussion will address burnout, finding your supports, and coming back stronger after some challenging times.*

In addition, we will feature a presentation from the League of Women Voters. Amy Kleissas, Director Civic Education, and Cynthia Cominsky, College/University Chair, of will discuss **"Why investing in informed, active young citizens is good for secondary/post-secondary education, but also is essential for our democracy"** The presentation will open by reviewing the broad overarching theme, "Civic Education" ("investing in informed, active young citizens"); continue with the High School Outreach portion including an update on the accomplishments, of Brentwood High School and Elizabeth Forward High School (winners Governor's Civic Engagement Award). Followed by the College/University voter education activities including an update on successes CCAC achieved participating in the "All in for Democracy Challenge." The goal of these programs is to not only register new voters, but also to empower them to become informed and active citizens who participate in our democracy. JSS is accepting scholarship applications! Apply today if you are a Jewish high school senior or student enrolled in an undergraduate, graduate or technical school with financial need with residency in Allegheny, Beaver, Butler, Washington or Westmoreland county.

Applications for need-based college scholarships for the 2021-2022 school year are available from the **Jewish Scholarship Service of Greater Pittsburgh (JSS) of the Jewish Federation of Greater Pittsburgh**. This program is administered by Jewish Family and Community Services. The funds are made available through the generosity of families who have established endowments through the Jewish Federation of Greater Pittsburgh, Jewish Community Center, National Council of Jewish Women, Jewish Women International of Pittsburgh (formerly *B'nai B'rith Women*), The Pittsburgh Foundation, and Rodef Shalom Congregation.

**All awards are distributed on the basis of demonstrated financial need.** Depending on the scholarship fund, other factors such as academic achievement, field of study, school attending, and Jewish and general community involvement will also be considered. In addition, the applicant must be Jewish, reside in Allegheny, Westmoreland, Beaver, Butler or Washington County for at least two years, and need financial assistance to attend an accredited institution of higher education.
