




POINT PARKUNIVERSITY

Point Park University provides innovative undergraduate and graduate education in a dynamic urban setting. Dedicated to academic excellence and community engagement, we prepare students of diverse backgrounds with the knowledge, skill, and experience to lead meaningful lives as informed citizens and successful professionals.

- In Fall 2022, we had 3,288 students enrolled as of census:
- Division: 2,418 (73.5%) are undergraduates, and 870 (26.5%) are graduate students
- Modality: 2,499 (76%) are on-ground or hybrid students, and 789 (24%) are fully online
- Course Load: 2,340 (71%) are full-time students, and 948 (29%) are part-time
- Age: the average age of our students is 25 years old
- Financial Aid: 89% of our students receive financial aid
- Pell Grant: 864 of our students (36% of undergraduates) received a Pell Grant in Fall 2022
- First Generation: 411 of our students (17% of undergraduates) reported being a first generation college student
- 891 students (27%) live on campus



While a student at Point Park University, has there ever been a time when you did not have enough food for yourself or your household?





How often do you think you would use a food pantry if one were available on campus?



Thanksgiving drive

Annual fund drive to collect funds to purchase Thanksgiving meal kits for students who are unable to travel home for the holiday or whose family is facing food insecurity







Tower Gardens



Two aeroponic gardens grow a variety of herbs and vegetables for students including cilantro, basil, lettuce, peas, and more.







Winter clothing drive

Annual drive to collect new and gently used winter clothing for students who may not have appropriate cold weather gear.







We provide personal care products to students in several ways:

- Menstruation Stations in recycled newspaper boxes around campus through Horned Groundhog Service Fellowship Student Group
- Menstruation supplies in bathrooms (men's, women's and gender neutral) through Strong Women, Strong Girls Group
- Menstruation supplies and other personal care products including soap, shampoo, toothpaste, laundry and dish detergent, diapers, school supplies and more through our Pioneer Pantry











Bison Exchange Thrift Store

- Started as Clothing Pantry and rebranded as Thrift Store in 2021
- Run by student organization (Horned Groundhog Service Fellowship)
- All items are \$2 or less
- Cards are available through Community Engagement office for students in need to shop for free
- Items are donated by students, faculty, staff, community members
- Regular fashion shows each semester

The Bison Exchange thrift shop sees about 60 student shoppers in an average week and has drawn upwards of 200 students at a time to its events.

All proceeds from the clothing sales go back into the store, the Point Park community or the greater Pittsburgh community, with Dawson and two other officers of the Bison Exchange making those decisions.

Recently, they used some proceeds to order hats, gloves and socks on Amazon to put together care packages for the homeless that they passed out Downtown.

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


Closing the Snap Gap

Spring 2023 Initiative to create campus community kitchenettes and teach students about ingredients, food safety, knife skills and cooking.












Do you have (or have ever had) to take out credit card debt to cover the cost of academic orliving expenses?







Would you utilize any of the following resources if there were available at Point Park? (check all that apply)






The COVID-19 pandemic effected me emotionally and impacted my ability to succeed in college (trauma, mental health, etc)
