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
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Learning Objectives

Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)


The FAFSA is a student's connection to funding. It is a federal form used to determine student eligibility for the following:

- Federal programs (Federal Pell Grant, Federal Work-Study, etc.)
- State programs (including PA State Grant, Chafee, FosterEd, etc.)
- School programs



2026-27 FAFSA

- The FAFSA is available online in English and Spanish.
- Must file a FAFSA **each year** a student attends school to be eligible.
- While filing the FAFSA online is preferred at **StudentAid.gov**, a printable PDF version is also available.



StudentAid.gov Account

- The student applying for aid and all contributors providing information on the FAFSA need to create a StudentAid.gov Account at StudentAid.gov/fsa-id/create-account.
- Students should use their **legal name**, as it is on their social security card. If a *name change* happens at any time, be sure to have student update their account.
- Legal signature for student and contributors.
- Users without an SSN will be able to acquire a StudentAid.gov Account.



FAFSA Personal Circumstances Questions

- A series of questions are asked to determine if the student is independent or dependent.
- If the student can say yes, to one of these questions, they are independent and will not provide parental information on the FAFSA.

Student Personal Circumstances

Select all that apply or "None of these apply."

The student is currently serving on active duty in the U.S. armed forces for purposes other than training. ⓘ

The student is a veteran of the U.S. armed forces. ⓘ

The student has children or other people (excluding their spouse) who live with them and receive more than half of their support from the student now and between July 1, 2026, and June 30, 2027. ⓘ

At any time since the student turned 13, they were an orphan (no living biological or adoptive parent). ⓘ

At any time since the student turned 13, they were a ward of the court. ⓘ

At any time since the student turned 13, they were in foster care. ⓘ

Foster Care and the FAFSA



- For the purposes of the FAFSA, a student is independent based on foster care status if they were **in foster care at any time since age 13**. This includes youth who were in foster care at age 13 or older and are no longer in foster care at the time they are applying for financial aid.
- If a student was in foster care or a ward of the court **before** age 13 but not after, they do **not** qualify as independent under this criterion.

Student Homelessness

- **Unaccompanied** - not living in the physical custody of a parent or guardian.
- **Homeless** - lacking fixed, regular, and adequate housing (i.e. living in shelters, parks, motels, hotels, or “couch surfing”).
- **At risk of being homeless** - housing may cease to be fixed, regular, and adequate.

Student Unusual Circumstances

This information will help us evaluate the student's ability to pay for school.

Do unusual circumstances prevent the student from contacting their parents or would contacting their parents pose a risk to the student? ⓘ

A student may be experiencing unusual circumstances if they

- left home due to an abusive or threatening environment;*
- are abandoned by or estranged from their parents;*
- have refugee or asylee status and are separated from their parents, or their parents are displaced in a foreign country;*
- are a victim of human trafficking;*
- are incarcerated, or their parents are incarcerated, and contact with the parents would pose a risk to the student; or*
- are otherwise unable to contact or locate their parents.*

If the student's circumstances resulted in not having a safe and stable place to live, they may be considered a homeless youth and should review the answer to the previous question about being unaccompanied and homeless.



GrantUs® - 2026-27 PA State Grant

- GrantUs® is PHEAA's PA State Grant and Special Programs online account management tool.
- Student's need to complete items such as the PA State Grant Form and High School Form within GrantUs® to be eligible for the PA State Grant Program.

PA Chafee Education and Training Grant (ETG) Program & Fostering Independence Tuition Waiver Program (FosterEd)

Chafee Education and Training Grant Program

(Chafee ETG) is a **federal** program administered by PHEAA on behalf of the PA Dept. of Human Services that offers **grants** to PA undergraduate students who are or were in foster care and attending an eligible postsecondary institution.

- Application deadline: March 31st
- Maximum award: \$5000

PA Fostering Independence Tuition Waiver Program

(FosterEd) is a **state** program that provides a **waiver** for **tuition and mandatory fees** charged by most postsecondary institutions **located in PA** for youth who are or were in foster care.

- Application Deadline: May 1st
- Award determined by unmet need for tuition and mandatory fees

**Please note that the maximum Chafee ETG award amount is subject to change due to Federal Grant levels.*

Chafee ETG & FosterEd Eligibility Requirements



- **File the FAFSA!**
- Be a PA resident
- Have foster care experience at age 16 or older
- Be under age 26 by July 1 of the upcoming academic year for which Chafee ETG is received
- Be enrolled as an undergraduate at least half-time at an approved school
- Demonstrate financial need as determined by the school
- Maintain satisfactory academic progress as determined by the school
- Not be in default on a federal student loan or owe a refund on other Title IV aid
- Not received Chafee ETG awards or Foster Ed Waivers for 10 semesters or the equivalent, for undergraduate study
- Have graduated from high school or have a Commonwealth Secondary School Diploma

PA Chafee ETG & FosterEd



- Chafee ETG and FosterEd have **separate award counters**.
- PA residents attending **out of state** schools may be eligible for Chafee ETG but not FosterEd.
- Chafee ETG is available fall, winter, & spring terms.
- FosterEd recipients may utilize the program fall, winter, spring, & **summer** terms.
- FosterEd recipients **do not** have to be awarded Chafee ETG funds.
- FosterEd recipients **must file a PA State Grant form** but **do not** have to be awarded a PA State Grant.
- Eligible students **may still need alternate sources of aid** (e.g., loans) to cover costs beyond tuition and mandatory fees.

Application Tips

- [2025-26 Chafee ETG/FosterEd Program Application](#)
- Ensure that all fields are completed and legible
- Application must be properly signed
- SSN and student name must match the FAFSA
- County that holds youth's foster care records is the county that had custody, which may not necessarily be the county of placement or the county of residence.

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What is a FosterEd Point-of-Contact (POC)

Required

- Each campus must designate at least one employee to serve as a Point-of-Contact (POC) for FosterEd students.
- Contact information for the POC(s) must be posted and easy to find on the campus’ website.
- Keep [POC information](#) up to date with PHEAA and on the web.
- **Review denial listings** and help students with denials that can be resolved (for example: unsigned application, blank county)
- Timely return of school certification documents to PHEAA

Recommended

- 2 POCs (no special training required)
 - Financial aid
 - Support and other resources
- Regular check-ins with students
- Network of resources identified for POCs and students
- Advocacy & compassion

What is a FosterEd Point-of-Contact (POC)

POC Responsibilities

- Serve as the **primary contact** for all eligible students applying to or attending the institution.
- Assist students in contacting DHS at linglezen@pa.gov if **help with eligibility** is needed.*
- Assist students in identifying and accessing **financial aid resources, scholarships, and grant opportunities**.
- Assist in connecting eligible **transfer students** with their new institution's FosterEd POC and inform PHEAA at FosterEd@pheaa.org.
- Provide applicants with information and referrals for **on- and off-campus support services and resources**, including but not limited to:
 - Admissions
 - Housing & transitional housing
 - Financial aid
 - Health
 - Mental health
 - Title IX
 - Academic advising
 - Learning support
 - Tutoring
 - Career services
 - Medical insurance programs
 - Food assistance
 - Other off-campus support services and social programs



I work with FC2C youth, how can I help?

- Help connect the student with their campus POC:
 - The Center for Schools and Communities': [Higher Education Single Point of Contact Directory](#)
 - Search the campus website for POCs and resources
 - Email FosterEd@pheaa.org
- Help with Chafee ETG/FosterEd application
 - Finding county of placement
 - Printing & scanning
 - Ensure legibility and that the [signature is valid](#)
 - Adding a .pdf or ZIP file password to protect student's sensitive information
- Advise students to verify identity when emailing PHEAA
 - full name, DOB, last 4 of SSN, current and/or former school
- Stay connected or provide a warm handoff to ensure support throughout their entire academic career
- Please do not send legal documents to PHEAA (court documents, social security cards, birth certificates, etc.)

PA State Grant



- Provides grant aid to applicants who demonstrate financial need and choose to attend a PHEAA-approved postsecondary educational institution.
- Eligibility is calculated in accordance with the Federal Need Analysis formula and PA State Grant policies
- Within Pennsylvania, eligible students may attend:
 - Most 2-year and 4-year colleges
 - Many Business, Trade and Technical (BTT) schools & Hospital Schools of Nursing, offering a program of at least 2 academic years in length

PA State Grant



Students must complete their FAFSA by the deadline to be considered for the PA State Grant.

- **May 1** - If you plan to enroll in a degree program or a college transferable program at a 2-year private college or other college or university.
- **August 1** - If you plan to enroll in a community college; a designated Pennsylvania Open-Admission institution; a business, trade, or technical school; a hospital school of nursing; or a 2-year program that is not transferable to another institution.

PA State Grant and Other Special Programs

- **Grow PA Scholarship Grant Program ([Grow PA](#))**
This program helps students pay for school and builds the workforce in PA for in-demand occupations.
- **PA Blind or Deaf Higher Education Beneficiary Grant Program ([BDBG](#))**
State-funded financial assistance to deaf or blind students attending a postsecondary institution
- **PA Mental Health Education Learning Programs in Schools ([PA HELPS](#))**
State-funded assistance for students completing internships in school-based mental health fields in PA
- **PA National Guard Educational Assistance Program ([EAP](#))**
Tuition assistance for members of the PA National Guard
- **PA National Guard Military Family Education Program ([MFEP](#))**
Tuition assistance for dependents (spouses & children) of PA Guard Members who enter an additional 6-year service commitment with the PA National Guard

Matching Funds program that partners with nonprofit, community-based PA organizations to leverage private donations as both a means and incentive to provide need-based educational grants to PA residents
